VET Options in Year 11 and Year 12



Apprenticeship/ Traineeship

Out of school or

School based (part-time apprenticeship/traineeship whilst at school)

Contributes to WACE (1 credit point per semester)



Certificate Courses

Cert II, III or IV

Contributes to WACE

- Cert II 1 credit point/semester
- Cert III or IV 2 credit points/semester



ADWPL (Workplace Learning)

Minimum of 55 hrs per semester + logbook + skills journal

Contributes to WACE (I credit point/semester)



VET Certificate Courses

Regulated by ASQA (Australian Skills Quality Authority)

- Cert II (Year 11) and Cert III (Year 12) in Music Industry
- Auspiced through COSAMP (RTO) Mr Thomson
- 2 year programme

Out of School VETDSS Certificates (VET Delivered to School Students)

- 1 (mostly) or 2 days a week outside of school
- 1 or 2 year programmes
- Cert II, III, or IV options
- Pre-apprenticeship/certificate
- Offered by both TAFEs (funded) and private RTOs (fee-for-service)

Good match for the student who:

- Is focussed on university entry at the end of Yr12
- Is academically strong and has well developed study skills
- Handles exams and high academic workload well

What do the goalposts look like?

- University entry based on 2 main criteria
 - o ATAR ranking
 - o English competency
 - and in some cases portfolio evidence and/or subject pre-requisites

What is ATAR ranking?

ATAR ranking comes from the results of the students top 4 ATAR subjects (after scaling)

An ATAR ranking is a percentile score, comparing the student against all other ATAR candidates in WA

 e.g. An ATAR of 85 means that you are in the top 15% of all students in the state

Universities generally choose the top-scoring eligible candidates that have applied for their specific course

What do I study?

ATAR subjects are chosen from a list of ATAR subjects offered by Rehoboth.

- A minimum of 4 ATAR subjects should be studied
- The remaining 2 subjects (students' study 6 subjects) can be chosen from ATAR, General or (in some cases) Certificate/VET subjects
- Subject selection should be guided by
 - Satisfying university course pre-requisites
 - Maximising potential ATAR score
 - O What are my interests?
- Consultation with subject teachers and Heads of Learning Areas is invaluable when making subject choices

What is English competency?

Universities want students who can show evidence of adequate skill in written English to pass course requirements.

This can be evidenced in a number of ways

- 1. C grade in ATAR English or ATAR English Literature
- 2. STAT Test (a one-off standardised test of English skills)
- 3. Successful completion of a University Enabling course (typically a 6-month course of study)

Students on an ATAR pathway should aim to get a C grade in ATAR English or Literature. Options 2 or 3 (above) are available as a back-up for a low English ATAR score <u>or</u> for students who don't study ATAR English/Literature.

Good match for the student who:

- Wants to focus on job-ready skills
- Is interested in further study in the VET area
- Wants to get to University via a VET pathway
- Wants to gain a trade qualification/apprenticeship etc

What does VETDSS mean?

VET Delivered to School Students is a program run by both Govt and private TAFE colleges. Typically, students attend an external college one or two days a week during school terms. VETDSS courses are either 1 or 2 years in duration.

What do I study?

Students choose a combination of VET certificates, ADWPL (workplace learning) and general studies.

- Cert II school based
- VETDSS at either TAFE or a private college (such as Fremantle Education Centre, Mount pleasant College etc)
- ADWPL (either 1 day a week or in own time)
- In some circumstances students may choose to study limited ATAR subjects for either interest or pre-requisite purposes (eg – ATAR English)
 - note: students studying ATAR subjects <u>must</u> sit the external exam to get unit credit

What do the goalposts look like?

This really depends on the goal. Let's look at a few possible goals:

I want to get an apprenticeship

- Successful completion of a preapprenticeship certificate at TAFE
- Successful completion of a schoolbased traineeship
- Pass grades in General English and Maths

I want to do higher level Vocational study

- Completion of a Cert II, III or IV (VETDSS) in an area of vocational interest
- Get some workplace experience (either through Certificate prac. placement) or through ADWPL to help with making decisions about higher study
 Apply for higher study (Cert IV, Diploma etc) after Yr12 (or after Yr11 in some

I want to get Job-Ready

- Completion of Cert II or Cert III (VETDSS) in an area of vocational interest
- Completion of ADWPL (workplace learning)

I want to go to university via VET

University entry (VET) will be based on 2 main criteria

- 1. English Competency
- 2. AQF Certificate IV or higher (diploma, advanced diploma)

English competency

- Pass in ATAR English or English Literature or
- Preparation for STAT test or
- Apply for Uni-enabling course after Yr12

AQF Cert IV or above

- Completion of Cert II or III
 (VETDSS) in order to enable
 enrolment in Cert IV after Yr 12
- In some cases, completion of Cert
 IV (limited VETDSS options)

A few things to note:

There is no one-size-fits all approach to subject selection. Decisions should take into account the individual's:

- Interests and passions
- Career goals
- Academic ability
- Capacity for different tasks (eg. Exams, Workplace maturity)
- Past academic record and study skills
- Pre-requisites for future study

Many students work towards gaining a WACE at the end of year 12.

The Western Australian Certificate or Education is gained by students who complete an adequate amount of unit credits across a range of subjects in year 11 and 12.

WACE credits can come from:

- ATAR subjects
- General subjects
- VET certificates
- Workplace learning (ADWPL)
- Other endorsed programs (traineeships etc)

Other WACE requirements include passing the required NAPLAN/OLNA level.

How does an ATAR relate to actual marks?

The ATAR-to-actual marks calculation changes every year and depends on what subjects you study (some subjects are scaled more than others) and what marks others achieved in that subject Australia wide

Can I change direction?

The answer is yes, most of the time, sort-of

Actually, the key to this is to keep talking about how things are going and not just bury your head in the sand if things are not going to the original plan.

It's normal for situations to change, interests to develop, capacities to be challenged and, sometimes, life just throws in a curveball. In the past students have:

- Changed some of their subject load from ATAR to General
- Picked up a VET qualification in Yr12 that they didn't consider in Yr11
- Decided to investigate a career option through workplace learning (with the hope of getting a job)
- Used a part-time job to get credit for workplace learning
- Pursued another full-time VET learning path before graduation

Options can always be found and are a lot less stressful to find if it's not "disaster-minus-1minute and counting". Having options is good.

When can a student leave school to pursue other alternatives?

Generally, a student needs to be enrolled in school unless they are:

- Enrolled in a full-time TAFE course
- Participating in a full-time apprenticeship or traineeship
- · Registered as being Home-schooled or
- No longer of compulsory school age

Can I go to TAFE?

In some circumstances, full-time TAFE may be a good option for a student with a specific Vocational focus. Many full-time TAFE courses have "c" grade or higher in Yr11 English as a pre-requisite.

Students and parents are reminded that TAFE is an adult-learning environment.
